# CHILD POVERTY (PSA, 2015)

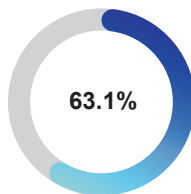
Child poverty incidence\* was consistently higher since 2006 compared to that of the general population (to the total number of children)



3 in every 10 children belong to poor families in



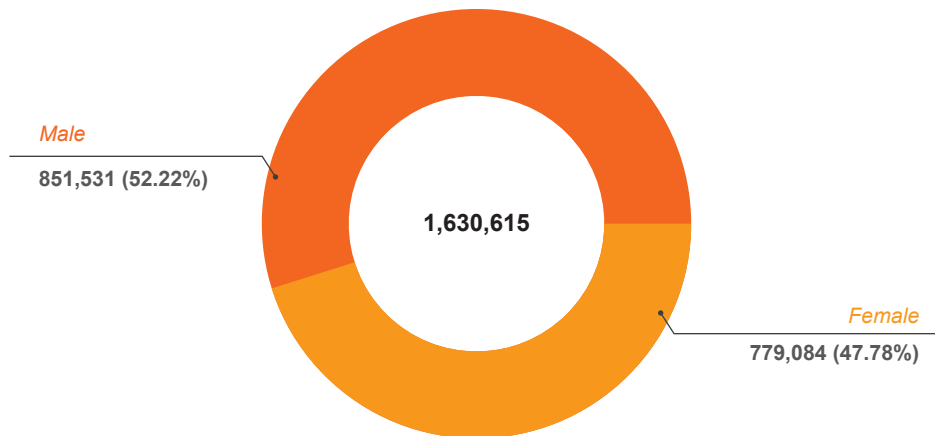
Poverty incidence among families of children is high for families with **> 7 family members** and whose head of the family has no grade completed

# TOTAL POPULATION OF CHILDREN REGISTERED AT BIRTH (2017)

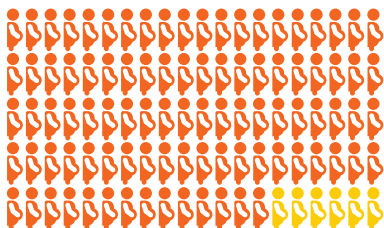

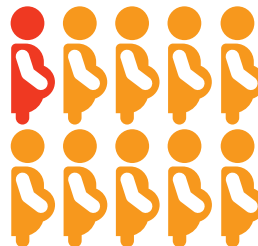

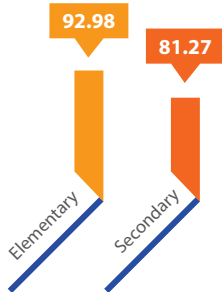
■ Gross Enrollment Rate (SY 2016-2017)



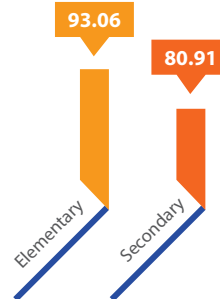
■ Net Enrollment Rate (SY 2016-2017)

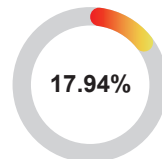

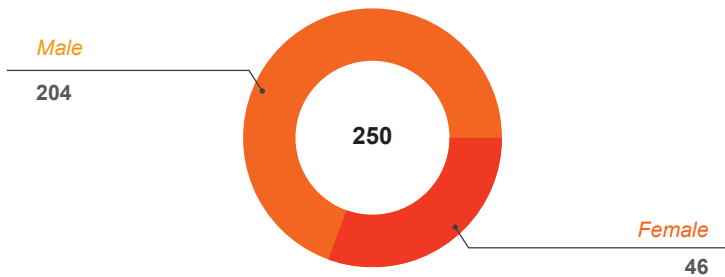

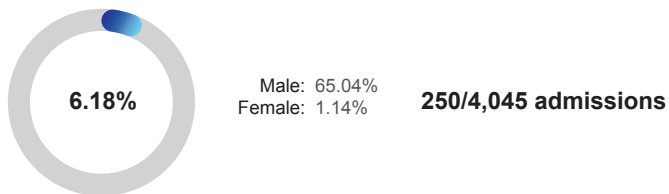

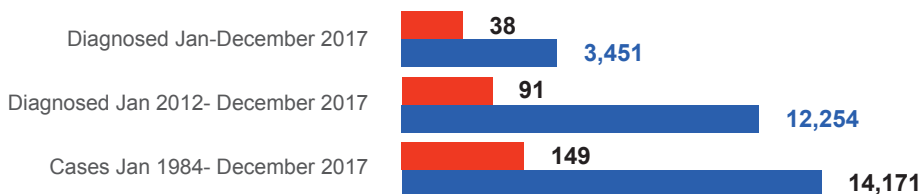

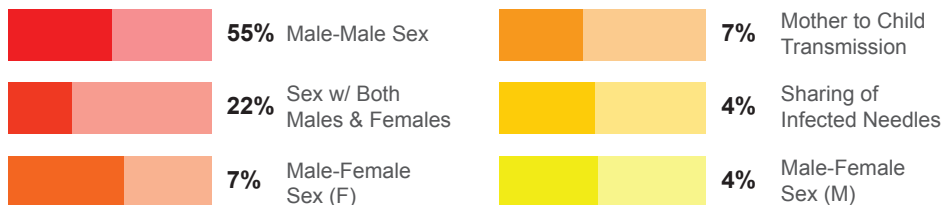

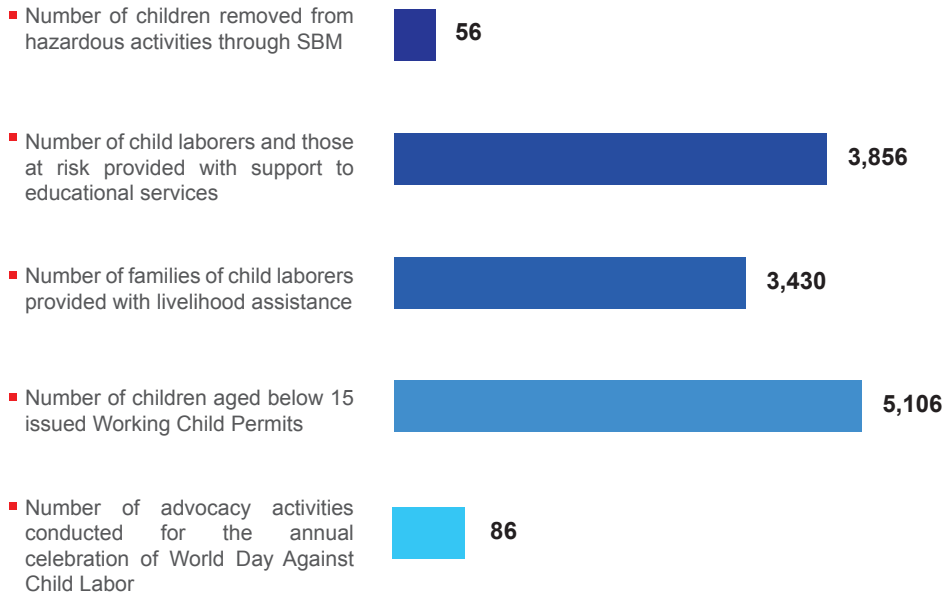


### Reported deaths among Children and Adolescents with Living with HIV (January 1984-December 2017)

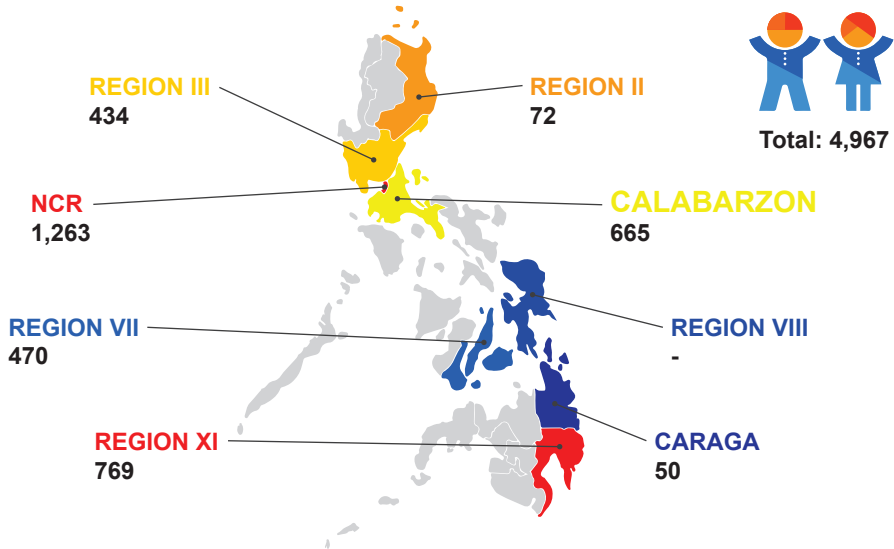

■ Number of homeless street families (child count) active beneficiaries of Modified Conditional Cash Transfer (MCCT HSF)



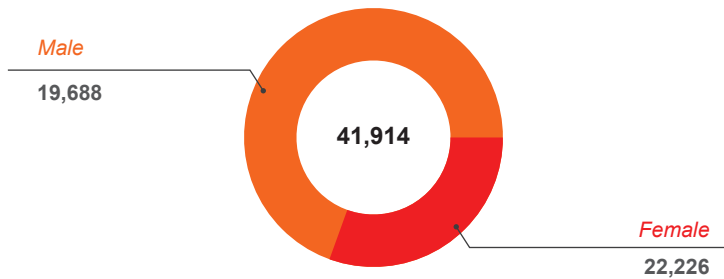

## Children in Situations of Armed Conflict (MRRS, 2017)

- 12 GCRV incidents recorded under CWC's MRRS. GCRVs are most related to killing, recruitment and use of children, attacks on schools. Among the 12 reported cases, 11 have already been validated and responded. Most of these cases are from Mindanao (ARMM, CARAGA, XI, XII), and some sporadic reports from Region IV-A and V.

Responses are given at the local level (City/Municipal and Provincial). Regional and National Offices also intervenes to augment/ support such initiatives that includes the following but not limited to:

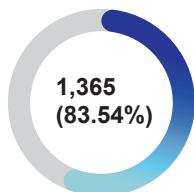

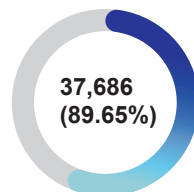
Total number of LGUs with Ideal level of LCPC Functionality



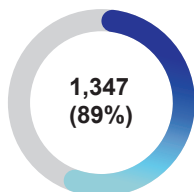

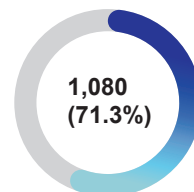


Number of LGUs with Local Code for Children

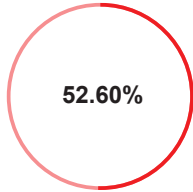

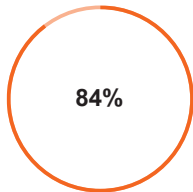

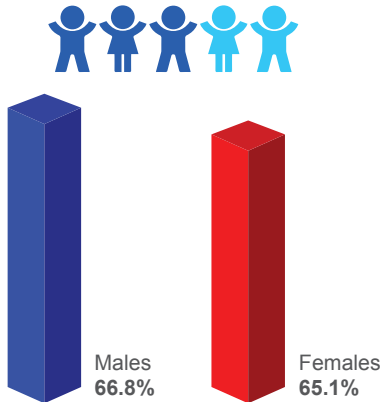

Percentage of children and youth, aged 13-24 years have experienced any one form of violence in their lifetime

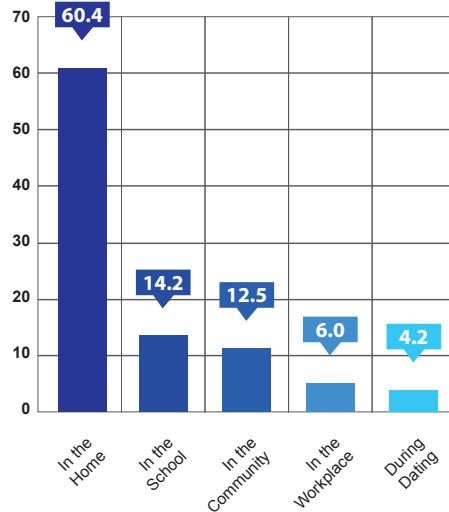

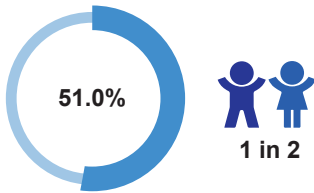

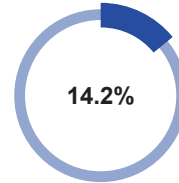

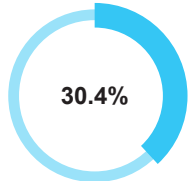

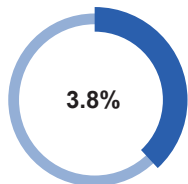
Percentage of children who attended school experienced physical violence in school



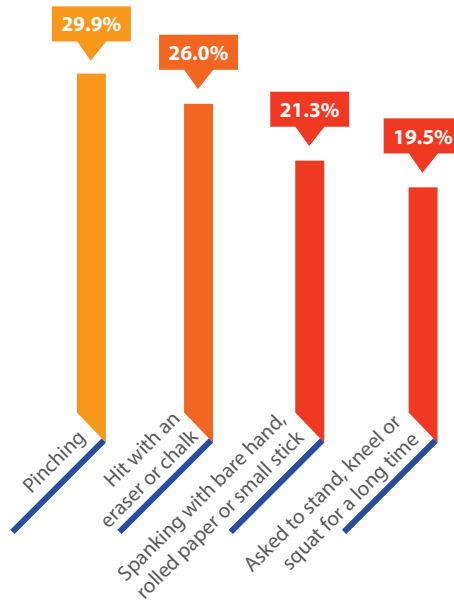

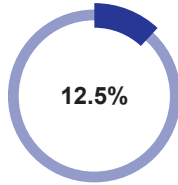

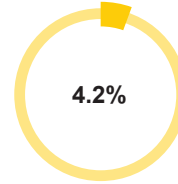

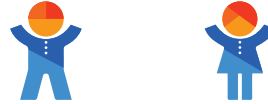

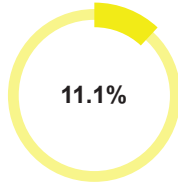

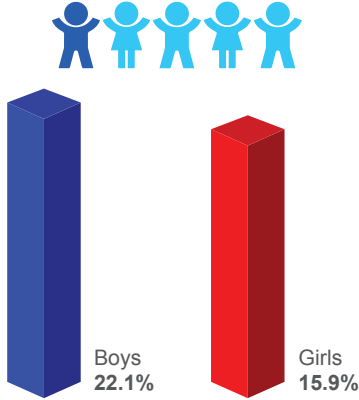
### Prevalence of Neglect and Witnessing Violence in the Home during Childhood



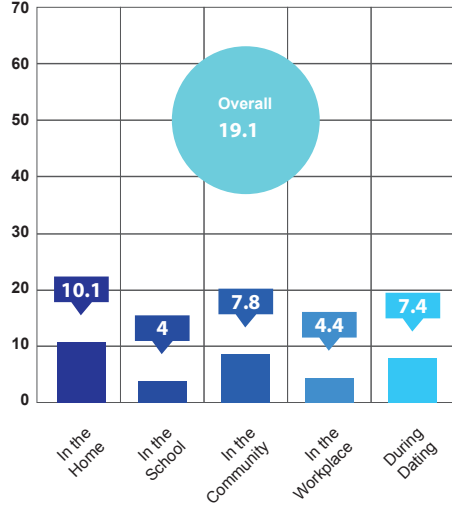

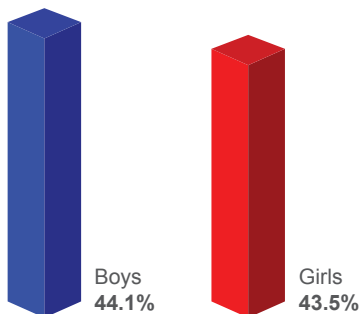

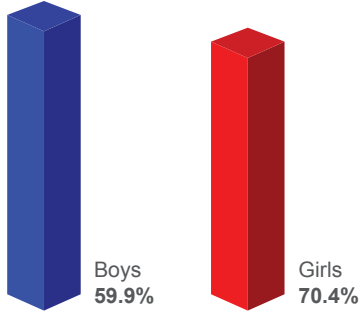

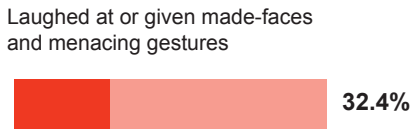

**LGBT children and youth: Highest prevalence for all forms**

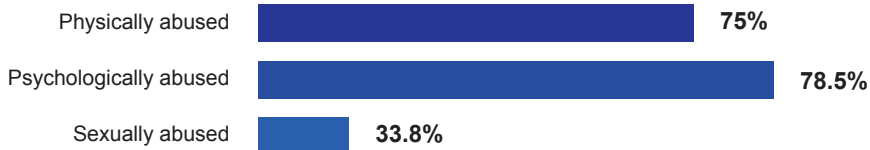
■ Almost **8 out of 10** LGBTs were physically and psychologically abused while a third were sexually abused



■ SLR on VAC (2016) underscored that:

 **LGBT youth may be particularly at risk of sexual violence at school - often from peers.**

 **LGBT children are also at higher risk for physical and psychological bullying at school.**

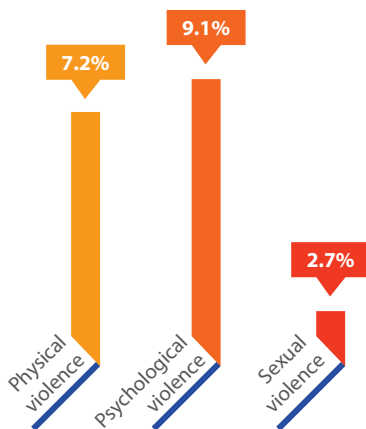
This means that experiencing one form of violence places the child at risk to experience other forms of violence.

Prevention and intervention services cannot focus only on one type of violence.

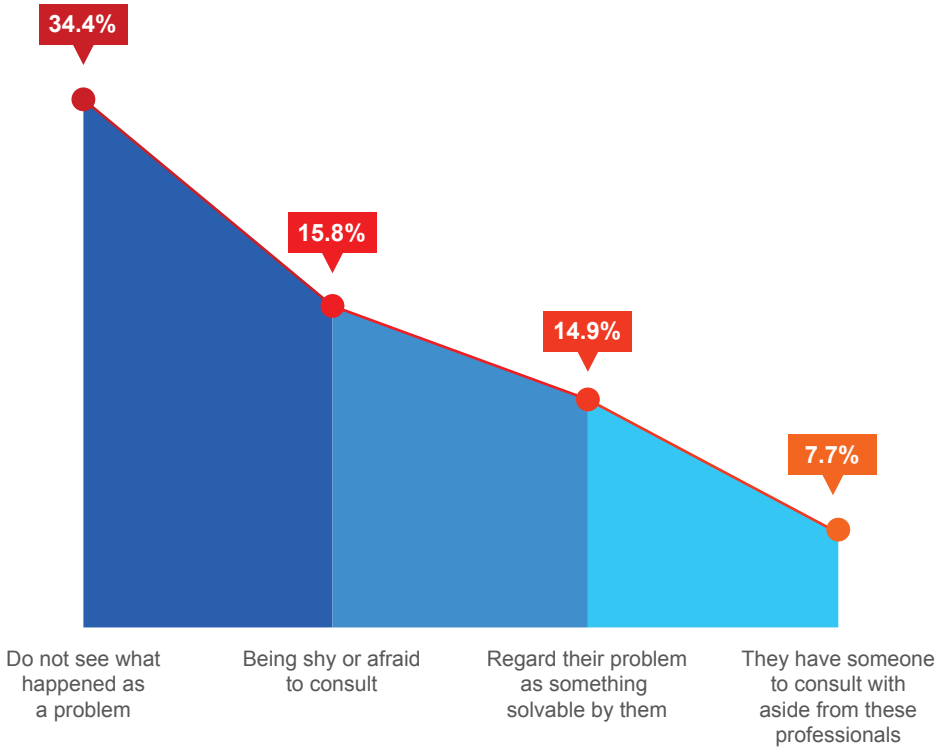
### Disclosure of abuse and help-seeking

- Few disclosed abuse
  - Mostly to friends and mothers
- Few sought help from professionals, specifically they sought from teachers and guidance counselors
- Less than **5%** reported to the authorities
- Only **29.2%** of children were aware of child protection services
- Of these, **30.5%** knew or utilized Women and Child Protection Units

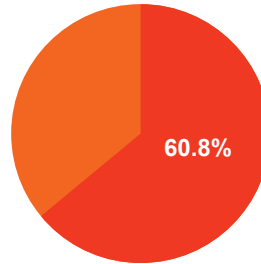
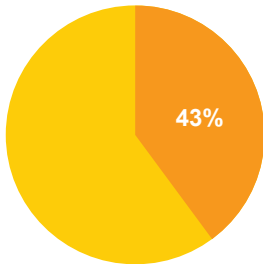

## Children and youth with early pregnancy

- Percentage of the 1,371 respondents aged 13-24 years who had engaged in sexual intercourse reported to have experienced pregnancy
- Percentage of pregnancies occurred when they were 15-19 years old



### Community stakeholders study

- Response to VAC mainly reactive
- LCPCs are not in place, or if ever, they are not at all functional or not fully functional
- No separate budget for child protection and no unified program
- Municipal /City social workers are expected to take charge of all social development programs, from conditional cash transfer programs to services for the elderly, migrants, children
- High acceptability of corporal punishment by everyone
- Child protection service providers lack prevention skills
- Availability of services depends on resources: cities have more resources than municipalities
- NGOs are important in initiating innovative programs, but these are few and mostly in the cities.

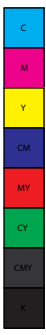

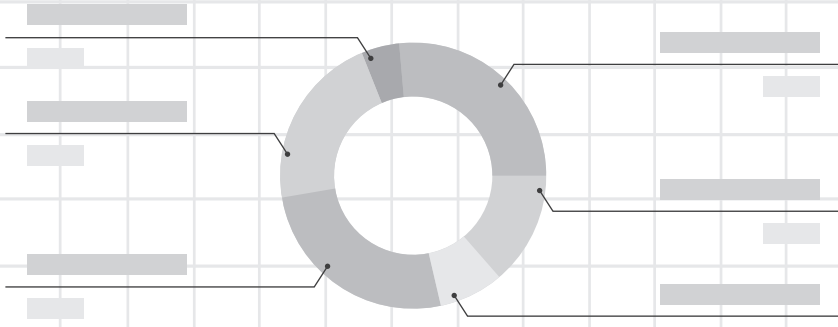
